ENVIRONMENTAL AND SOCIAL COMMITMENT PLAN

- 1. The Federal Democratic Republic of Ethiopia (the Recipient) will implement the Emergency Locust Response Program- Phase 1 Ethiopia Additional Financing (P178434) (the Project) with the involvement of the Ministry of Agriculture (MoA), as set out in the Financing Agreement. The International Development Association (the Association) has agreed to provide financing for the Project, as set out in the referred agreement.
- 2. The Recipient shall ensure that the Project is carried out in accordance with the Environmental and Social Standards (ESSs) and this Environmental and Social Commitment Plan (ESCP), in a manner acceptable to the Association. The ESCP is a part of the Financing Agreement and the Project Agreement. Unless otherwise defined in this ESCP, capitalized terms used in this ESCP have the meanings ascribed to them in the referred agreement.
- 3. Without limitation to the foregoing, this ESCP sets out material measures and actions that the Recipient shall carry out or cause to be carried out, including, as applicable, the timeframes of the actions and measures, institutional, staffing, training, monitoring, and reporting arrangements, and grievance management. The ESCP also sets out the environmental and social (E&S) instruments that shall be adopted and implemented under the Project, all of which shall be subject to prior consultation and disclosure, consistent with the ESS, and in form and substance, and in a manner acceptable to the Association. Once adopted, the said E&S instruments may be revised from time to time with prior written agreement by the Association.
- 4. As agreed by the Association and the Recipient, this ESCP will be revised from time to time if necessary, during Project implementation, to reflect adaptive management of Project changes and unforeseen circumstances or in response to Project performance. In such circumstances, the Recipient through the Ministry of Agriculture and the Association agree to update the ESCP to reflect these changes through an exchange of letters signed between the Association and the Recipient, through the Ministry of Agriculture. The Recipient shall promptly disclose the updated ESCP.

The SMP shall also include standards, protocols, and codes of conduct for the selection and assignment of security personnel to the Project, and to screen such personnel to verify that they have not engaged in past unlawful or abusive behavior, including sexual exploitation and abuse (SEA), sexual harassment (SH) or excessive use of force. Any security personnel deployed in relation to the Project shall be trained prior to deployment and on a regular basis, on the use of force and appropriate conduct (including in relation to civilian-military engagement, SEA and SH, and other relevant areas).

5.2 **RESETTLEMENT PLANS**

- A. The AF project proposed regional base construction which involve civil works shall adopt and implement a Resettlement Policy Framework (RPF) for the Project, consistent with the requirements of ESS5.
- B. In accordance with the RPF and ESS5, and in a manner satisfactory to the Association, adopt and implement a resettlement action plan (RAP) for the regional base construction under the Project.
- C. Unless otherwise agreed by the Association in writing, no construction may take place under the Project other than on the existing premises of plant laboratories. The Association will document an environmental and social due diligence assessment to ensure that these constructions happen in exiting premises and the sites are acquired contemporaneously or in anticipation of the proposed project additional finance.
- A. Adopt and implement an RF before disbursement to component 3, and thereafter implement the RF throughout Project implementation.
- B. Adopt and implement the respective RAP to the satisfaction of the Association, including ensuring that before taking possession of the land and related assets, full compensation has been provided and as applicable displaced people have been resettled and moving have been allowances provided.
